Delwood could have been called Oinkers Acres

Did you know our neighbourhood used to have a pig farm right around where the hall is now located? A farmyard with mules and roosters was also located on the northeast end.

The Delwood area was first populated in the early 1900s, but developed primarily in the 1960s, back when Delwood Road was a slough that created many problems for the heavy duty equipment brought in by home builders. The community was likely named in honour of Edward Delegare "Del" Grierson, a prominent land owner and politician who

served several terms on City Council. He came to Edmonton in the 1890s while in the employ of the CPR. He purchased property on Jasper Avenue and was a real estate speculator. Delwood replaced the old subdivision names of Industrial Centre, Queen's Park and East Delton.

Josef Chelen Park, located in the northeast corner of the neighbourhood, was named after Josef Chelen who was a Polish-born market gardener in the Beverly Area.

Highlights of meetings during the first year of Delwood Community League (1965/66)

Around 40 people attended the first meeting of the new Delwood Community League that was held at the Balwin School auditorium on June 23, 1965.

"Memberships are the essence of our league." In August, there were 68 memberships sold – \$10 per family, \$5 for couples/individuals and \$1.00 for families who could not afford the full amount. General meetings were held the first Wednesday of each month and by October, there were 114 memberships. Regular

membership drives were held to boost enrollment to reach the magic number of 167 that would allow grants of \$500 to support the league. Many homes didn't have house numbers or official addresses at the time so it was a challenge! But it worked — there were 179 members by January 1966 and the grants started coming in. Through the efforts of the membership director and his wife, a map of Delwood was developed and each house number was recorded by hand. The original map will be on display at the 50th anniversary celebration.

There were several discussions about schools and community leagues merging facilities and land space as there were many advantages. The league had offers of space from neighbouring leagues and schools such as O'Leary High to host programs. Several programs were held and were noted as being successful.

Members of Belvedere and Balwin community leagues provided a lot of support and ideas during the first few development vears. Delwood kids went to Balwin or Belvedere playschools until Delwood playschool was available (\$4-6 per child per month). By October, there were 20 children from Delwood attending playschool.

The league supported other organizations from the very first year — \$15.00 was donated to the Boysdale Camp Swimming Pool that was supported by the Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues.

Memories of K-Days

The league operated a concession during K-Days, called the Prospector's Inn, for several years as a fundraiser. Homemade cabbage rolls and perogies were prepared by volunteers at the hall, some of whom would arrive at 2:30 a.m. every day for the entire two weeks of K-Days. The food was then brought to the grounds to be served hot along with sausage for fair goers. Many of the kids growing up in the neighborhood will remember going to the booth to get a hamburger.



More than \$60,000 was raised, which paid off the hall construction, and was used for sports uniforms and team fees, and to maintain and improve the rink shack.

A replica of the Prospector's Inn has been built especially for the 50th Anniversary event and will be located by the hall. In the same years, the league offered raffles and sweepstakes, including two dream homes, the first homes with two stories in Delwood, that were located on the east side of the neighbourhood. All of these fundraisers helped to pay for the hall and amenities that helped Delwood grow by attracting new families.




Were you a Delwood Queen?

Delwood's Ice Carnivals were a highlight of winter from the late 1960s until the 1980s, featuring a hockey tournament, broom balls games, figure skating show and of course there was plenty of food. The Carnival Queen was selected based on which young lady sold the most raffle tickets. To change

the Carnival theme just a bit, the league sponsored a Rodeo Queen Contest in 1968. By 1970, the Carnival had returned to normal and was definitely an annual event until the early 1980s.





Delwood's got Talent!

Many people growing up in this neighbourhood got their first taste of what it felt like to share their gifts and talents with others at the league's talent shows. The first talent show was held in February 1966 at the Balwin Jr. High School. Judging was taken very seriously, with individuals hired to come in and assess the levels of singing, instrument playing and dancing. In later years, the Delwood Community League teamed up with the neighboring Balwin League to hold a bigger talent show. Certificates and prizes were given to the participants and it was a great time to put some spotlight on Delwood's young performers.



Creating Community through Sports, Recreation and Fun!

Since the early 1960's, neighbours have helped each other and worked together to grow Delwood into one of the quiet gems of the city. Sports have been a key part of bringing people together, and over the years, Delwood's teams have represented their community at the city and provincial level many times, bringing home medals of all colours.

The skating rink has been a continuous hub of winter activity and a place where many memories have been made for Delwoodians young and old. The very first rink shack was donated by Imperial Oil and brought in by Turner Valley Transport in the winter of 1965/66. A portable skating rink was purchased for \$532.00, with lights adding an extra \$200 to the bill.



The ice for the first several winters was watered by hoses from homes located across the street, with occasional help from the fire department. Many kids were, and still are, signaled to go home for supper with a porch light or once the street lights came on.

There have been hundreds, maybe thousands, of hockey, broomball and shinny games played at the rink, as well as hours of figure skating spins and leaps. There was even a time when ringette was played at the community league level. The first hockey teams were based out of Balwin and Belvedere, but soon, Delwood was represented by up to 24 teams that were very successful! Hockey continued to be a popular sport for many years, with even some young local players going on to play in the NHL.

The league was the only league in 1975 which had a boy's basketball team. Since the boy's team did not have any competition it was decided to let the boy's team play in

the girls' league along with Delwood's girl's team. The boys who thought they would have easy victories found the girls a bit more competition than expected, partly because they were a little older and bigger. The Bantam girls' basketball team won the Provincial Championship in 1972, with members of that team still getting together whenever they can to share memories of that exciting time.

In 1979, an Edmonton Examiner reported Delwood as having "massive" numbers of children

involved in their sports program. It was definitely a lively place to be if you were a kid, and the parents had many good times supporting the local teams. Basketball continued to be a popular sport with great success. Baseball was also doing well, with teams playing at the provincial level. The 1982 provincials were hosted by Delwood's team that had won the previous year. Also in that year, the girls' softball team from Delwood became

the city's tier one champs. Other activities offered during this time were Brownies, Scouts and Girl Guides.

With city-wide changes in how children's sports and activities were organized starting in the late 1980s and early 1990s, young Delwoodians started moving to playing for teams all over the city depending on the sport — hockey being one of the main changes. At the same time, Delwood's population of young people started to fall and there was less need for as many team sport options. As the Delwood School

population increased, and the original residents' grandchildren started popping up, the playground became very important, and so a new playground was built in 1990 to provide a safe, fun place to play.

Since 1990 outdoor soccer started to gain momentum

as the league's primary sponsored sport, and the numbers of children representing Delwood has steadily grown. In the mid 1990s indoor soccer gains popularity. With soccer being offered year round Delwood has had as many as 350 players registered (approximately 22 teams) in one year. In the classic spirit of "you get what you give" Delwood's continued support of other organizations was acknowledged

with a donation of \$10,000 to the soccer program when the Spartans mens club disbanded in 2012. The soccer teams have continued Delwood's proud tradition of excellence, and have gone to cities, inter-cities and provincials, with many medals won. In addition to soccer, sports programs offered through the league have included a strongman group, yoga and karate.

Over the years, Delwood's Community Hall has hosted many family events such as baby showers, birthdays, anniversaries, and weddings. It also provides a gathering point for a number of community parties. In addition to many community dances, New Year's Eve parties, cribbage tournaments, card and pub nights, bingos, movie nights, women's shows, Oscar parties, bazaars and craft sales, and fall festivals have brought residents, friends and visitors together at the hall. Many friendships have been formed, first kisses were had, and love and life equally celebrated within these walls.

Delwood Community League Timeline

1962: 137 Ave (Delwood's north boundary) was city limits. Much of the land that became Delwood was owned by a single family, with pieces sold off over time to developers.

1965: first meeting of the Delwood Community League was held in June and the league was represented at the Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues.

1966: first rink shack and ice in place. League by-laws were officially accepted and registered in February.

1969: hall built. The League was now established enough that it was confident in its ability to raise money to start

Did you know?

Memberships in 1965, the first year of the league, were \$10 per family, \$5 for couples/individuals and \$1.00 for families who could not afford the full amount. Revenue from membership sales is used to build the hall and rink, and support programs.

In 2015, 50 years later, memberships are \$25 per household, \$15 for individuals, and \$10 for seniors. Inflation has not really caught up to membership costs, but the benefits have increased a great deal. Membership now includes free skating, free swimming, and discounts on hall rentals, league programs, and recreation passes.

construction of the hall and to pay off incurred loans. The league received many compliments about the suitability of the building for a wide variety of functions and for having a tremendous atmosphere. The hall was built at a cost of about \$53,000, which was subsidized by a city grant of \$8,000, membership sales, private donations and a bank loan. To be eligible for grants, 1/3 of the community needed to be members of the league, so door-to-door membership drives, including 5-year memberships for \$50, got people involved. The original hall did not include the foyer or kitchen, and ended at the stage.

1960s to early 1970s: Delwood was known as the "rabbit patch" because there were so many young children in this developing part of the city! Residents from that time remember it was a close knit community where everyone knew each other. Lots of community dances were held to raise money for the hall and league programs, and it was a steal of deal for date night – \$3.00 per couple, beer was 4/\$1.00 and hard liquor was 3/\$1.00. Sandwiches, pickles and coffee were also served. The early dances were advertised across the city, and were well-attended.

1970: a regular newsletter for members is being published, called the Delwood Community Views. Sports programs are highlights for the league, as well as many social nights.

1971: the league was holding regular bingos in conjunction with the Knights of Columbus. Christmas trees were sold on an empty lot beside Balwin food market to raise funds for the community.

1972: first casino. Hall rentals started to bring in some funds and the first rink shack was sold for \$145.00. City transit started, with Delwood residents who were right on the bus routes paying a little more in taxes than their neighbours, all for the privilege of priority garbage pickup and snow removal!

1977/78: an extension to the hall was built for about \$16,500. The monies were raised with raffles and bingos in the community. One of the raffles brought in \$35,000 by offering prizes of a car for the grand prize, a boat and motor for second, and one of those new fangled microwaves for third place.

1981: the issue of most concern for Delwood was the proposed extension of the Capilano Freeway. This was one of many times when the league made full use of its civic responsibilities, and held meetings and coordinated consultations between the city and the community members.

1983: another addition and a general renovation to the hall was accomplished along with upgrades to the rink shack using a \$60,000.00 loan to get things started. The city came through with a grant in 1984 for \$130,200.00 to help defray the \$306,943.20 bill for the addition. The Ladies Club held fundraisers and other events and donated \$97.00 to the League. The newsletter underwent a revision; the format and editorial content were changed and the title was shortened to "Delwood Views".

1984: the big social event of the year was the Perogy Supper and Dance. Around this time is when there was first involvement with the Neighbourhood Watch Program. Involvement in this program has fluctuated throughout the years depending on the number of volunteers available. The league has continued to be in contact with police and City representatives to identify concerns and promote neighbourhood safety.






1990: Delwood Community League celebrates 25 years with a weekend event and banquet. A cookbook was developed and sold as a legacy project, and there was an enormous flower display in the shape of the number 25 established on the sliding hill. Improvements were made to the hall using provincial and city grant funds. The neighbourhood is maturing as many of the young children who were raised in Delwood have grown up and moved away. The number of sports teams goes down and sports are now being organized differently as club teams are introduced.

1999/2000: a new logo is adopted to represent the league, introduces the slogan "A Great Place to Grow" that works for both children and the area's many gardeners. Younger families slowly start moving into the neighbourhood, movie nights at the hall become very popular, and the sights and sounds of renovations and upgrades to homes built in the 1960s become more common. The league's website, www. delwood.ca. is launched.

2001: Re-Use Roundups started to be held in Delwood in partnership with the City of Edmonton. The league sponsors a Front Yards in Bloom Contest.

area starts to increase as some original families move on to retirement. Hiring a STEP student to provide a Green Shack program over the summer is important to create a fun atmosphere for the growing number of children in the area.

2003: the rink is flooded and operated by a paid caretaker for the first time. Operating the rink and a small concession has always included keeping an eye out that every one using the rink is having a good time and that it continues to be a safe place. The Halloween Safe Stop is once again a chance for children to warm up with a hot chocolate while they are making the rounds to fill up their candy bags.

2005: fundraising for the new rink has been very successful, and matched with city and provincial grants and sweat equity worth about \$20,000. The new rink is built which includes a floor inlay, in the shack, of the Delwood logo, and the paved space from the original rink provided a second, smaller rink for young children, and place

Delwood raising money to repair skating rink

Delwood residents are pitching in to patch up an important place in their community - the outdoor rink.

"The boards are pretty decrepit," says Rhonda Polowek, spokesperson for the Delwood Community League. "It's to the point where something has to be done. It's a safety concern."

Community members are holding a skate-a-thon fund-raiser March 1, hoping to net funds for the repairs.

Polowek says the

Polowek says the Delwood Community

League hopes to raise \$30,000 in the next 18 months.

"We have to raise at least \$30,000 so we can apply for a grant from the city for the other half,"

While the community wants the boards replaced before next winter, Polowek predicts it might

not happen until 2004. The rink, which was built in 1969, is a popular spot for neighbourhood kids, says Polowek, kids, says Polowek, noting on a nice night at least 30 kids can be seen skating or hockey

The group has more fund-raising ideas including a pub night, perhaps a summer walk-a-thon and another skatea-thon next winter.

So far support from the community in terms of donations and prizes has been great.

"We're encouraging people to come out. We'll continue to take pledges right until the boards are being put on," Polowek adds.

for summer programs such as a skate park. Hall expenses include \$17,600 for stucco and repairs to the exterior. Bingos start to be a regular source of fundraising revenue.

2007: first Fall Festival is held and becomes a favourite annual event for neighbours and friends from all over the city. The event continues for several years, with activities and entertainment ranging from bouncy tents, petting zoo, dunk tank, show and shine, roller derby, wrestling, agility dogs, beer gardens, vendor displays and of course. FOOD!

2008: partnerships with City of Edmonton Community Services bring some new programs in addition the annual Green Shack. Cooking, crafts, arts, babysitting courses and winter fun days all help young Delwoodians get to know each other.

2010: the league launches its Facebook page. Craft sales and garage sales organized by volunteers bring in extra funds and build a strong sense of pride in what our community can accomplish.

2013: the league starts planning and fundraising for upcoming big projects including a hall renovation and playground rejuvenation. Volunteer numbers are sufficient to cover casinos and bingos thanks to required commitments from soccer families, but volunteers for board positions for the league are a little harder to come by. It's thanks to the continued dedication of some key volunteers that the league can continue meeting its requirements and continue planning for the future.



The Importance of Buying Local


